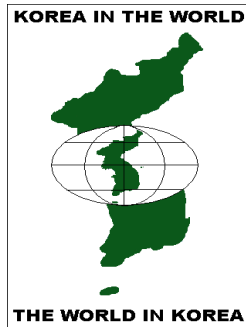

The Global Korea Award

The Global Korea Award (GKA) was created by the Council on Korean Studies at Michigan State University in 1995 to recognize individuals or groups who have made significant contribution of cross-cultural understanding, global education, and well-being of Korean people around the world. The selection criteria for the award include:

- Demonstrated commitment and unselfish devotion to the well-beings of Korean community and global society,
- Significant contribution to the improvement of understanding between Korean and people around the world,
- Exceptional devotion to quality education for young generation in Korea and the world, and
- Outstanding achievement in scholarly and creative work that advances global understanding of Korea in the global community.

Profiles of the 2013 Award Recipients

Boo Kyum Kim

Boo Kyum Kim was a leader for the Student Movement for Democracy which paved the way for his illustrious political career that entailed three terms in the Korean National Assembly as a member of the Korean Democratic Party. After a long and hard fought struggle for Korean democratization, he served in the staff of the opposition party – DJ's Party. He, then, was elected in the Seoul Metropolitan Area from 2000 to 2012 for three terms as a Korean National Assemblyman. In 2005, he was the Deputy Floor Leader of the Democratic Party and in 2008, he was the Chairman of Education, Science, and Technology Committee of the Korean National Assembly. And in 2012, he was the Member of the Supreme Committee of the Democratic Party. In the 2012 general elections, he left the pro-democratic Seoul Metropolitan Area and attempted to break down years of rigid regionalism by running for Assemblyman in Daegu, traditionally a very conservative city, which had never elected a democratic assemblyman in 30 years prior to his running. Although he was unable to win the election, he received more than 40% of the vote, which was unprecedented in Daegu. By running for a position in Daegu, he was successful in breaking down regionalism-based politics and foreshadowed a future change in Korean politics. After laying down the foundations for a transparent, sustainable and a working democratic government, he is still painstakingly working for a prolonged peace and prosperity in Northeast Asia as well as the Korean peninsula. He played a critical role in the readjustment of the Korean banking system (after the 1999 IMF shock) and readjusting the ODA system of Korea. He also was instrumental in creating

the National Trust for Cultural Heritage system and in making the Democratic Law of Mass Communication.

Dai Sil Kim-Gibson, Ph.D.

Kim-Gibson was born in North Korea and came to the United States in 1962 where she received her Ph.D. in Religion at Boston University. Before being a documentarian, she had a career as federal and state government employee. Her films, then, are always interested in the relations between state power and individuals. In *Wet Sands: Voices of L.A.* and *Sa-I-Gu*, Kim-Gibson and her long-time collaborator, Charles Burnett (who has a stellar career as a feature film director), explore the 1992 civil unrest in Los Angeles through very personal, very specific points of view of people touched by the events. *Sa-I-Gu* is concerned with Korean-American women who lived through the riots while *Wet Sands*, in which Kim-Gibson comes back to L.A. ten years later, tries to give a bigger picture, including more minorities and the opinions of state officials. Less personal, while being more ambitious, *Wet Sands* lacks the power of the more intimate accounts in *Sa-I-Gu* and shows where the director's self-imposed limitations as documentary filmmaker can be problematic. Kim-Gibson approaches her subject matter chiefly through firsthand accounts – oral history. Her camera straightened on the faces of those who have witnessed history first hand, she lets them speak, lets them tell in their own words and relate to us what happened, sometimes far from what official history taught us. *Silence Broken* is a raw, sometimes angry film about Korean girls who were forced into sexual slavery by the Japanese military during World War II. Providing almost no context, no so-called facts, the film provides us immediately with the accounts of various women who were forced to be “comfort women” during the war years. Their memories are horrifying, and Kim-Gibson simply needs to intercut with an interview of two very serious Japanese History professors who try their best to downplay the issue to make us realize that history has been lived and suffered by real human beings and is not an abstract data set in a book.

PURPOSE

The Council on Korean Studies at Michigan State University was established formally in 1992. The council's main objective is:

- To stimulate interest in Korea among the people of Michigan and the United States,
- To seek and provide information about the Korean cultural activities,
- To exchange programs between Korea and the United States related to art, literature and science,
- To help start and continue Korea-related programs at MSU and other American
- To promote graduate and undergraduate education about Korea and related outreach programs.

MEMBERSHIP

Membership is open to all people interested in Korean affairs. The president, the officers, and the Governing Board are elected by the members as specified by the Council's bylaws. There are five types of memberships: Corporate Member, Individual Life Time Member, Benefactor, Full Member and Associate Member.

ENDOWMENT

The council established an endowment fund in 1992 to provide financial support for its activities. The fund is administrated through the Asian Studies Center in consultation with the Council. A campaign is underway to raise \$2,000,000 in endowment.

ACTIVITIES

The Council has been actively engaged in organizing international conferences, holding a series of workshops and seminars, presenting several cultural events to introduce Korean culture to the large community surrounding MSU, and publishing some publications.
