The Global Korea Award

The Global Korea Award (GKA) was created by the Council on Korean Studies at Michigan State University in 1995 to recognize individuals or groups who have made significant contribution of cross-cultural understanding, global education, and well-being of Korean people around the world. The selection criteria for the award include:

- Demonstrated commitment and unselfish devotion to the well-beings of Korean community and global society,
- Significant contribution to the improvement of understanding between Korean and people around the world,
- Exceptional devotion to quality education for young generation in Korea and the world, and
- Outstanding achievement in scholarly and creative work that advances global understanding of Korea in the global community.

Profiles of the 2009 Award Recipients

Marn J. Cha, Ph.D.

In his 52 years of life in the United States, Dr. Cha received three degrees, B.A., MPA, and Ph.D., from the University of Southern California, and has spent 40 years of his professional career as a professor of political science at California State University, Fresno. Professor Cha has lived with a strong belief helping the next generations of Korean descent to maintain a healthy identity by understanding their roots and ethnic heritage. To this end, Professor Cha and a group of his supporters founded the Central California Korean Historical Society (CCKHS) in 2003. Under CCKHS tutelage, Professor Cha uncovered the remains of the 213 early Korean immigrants buried in cemeteries in the two Central California farm towns of Reedley and Dinuba. For the past six years, he has spent his time reconstructing the lives of these early Korean settlers in the California heartland. Their lives revolved around two churches they built in 1912 and 1938, carrying out a variety of patriotic activities led by Syngman Rhee and Ahn Chang-ho in the early 20th century. His book about these Korean settlers is at the last stage of completion. Former Mayor of Reedley, Joseph Rhodes has said, "We support Dr. Cha's effort because knowing one's roots is everybody's business. It helps us understand one another better, enriching our lives individually and collectively."

Chung Youn Kim

Ms. Chung Youn Kim is a self-supporting medical missionary in Uganda. She was dispatched to Uganda as a principal of the Kuluva Hospital School of

Nursing in Arua in 1985. Since 1993, she has been working as diocesan health coordinator in Nebbi Diocese. Before coming to Uganda, she worked in the United States as a registered nurse at Rolling Hill Hospital Intensive Care Unit in Philadelphia, and as an assistant administrator at the Philip Jaishon Memorial Medical Center in Philadelphia. She also served as assistant pastor of the Korean Central Church of Philadelphia. Ms. Chung Youn Kim received her B.A. in political science from Dankuk University, and her registered nurse degree from Kaejong School of Nursing in Korea. In Uganda, Ms. Chung Youn Kim has run a nursing assistant certificate program at the Kuluva Hospital School of Nursing in Arua, and has trained students in leadership and evangelism. As a health coordinator in Nebbi Diocese, she has been responsible for managing four health centers in that area. In 2000, she started a Wholistic Ministry Program with other church leaders in order to develop the physical, spiritual, psychological, and social-economical aspects of lives of the Christians in the Diocese.

Harry Kim

When Mr. Harry Kim was elected mayor of Hilo, Hawaii County, Hawaii, in 2000 at age 61, he became the first Korean-American elected official in the United States. His life story is classically that of a new American's struggle and success. At the same time he portrays the best characteristics of his Korean cultural ancestry. Mr. Kim's parents were among the first Korean immigrants who came to Hawaii 100 years ago. He was born in Hawaii. Poor, he hardly spoke English. The Kims lived with their eight children in a one-room house on a tiny farm on Hilo, the "Big Island." Young Harry was highly motivated to succeed, although school was difficult because of having to use English. In high school his teachers considered him an academic failure. However, thirteen years later he earned a bachelor's degree in sociology and a master's degree in economics from Southern Oregon University. Before serving as mayor, he worked as law enforcement assistance agency director and civil defense administrator in Hilo. As mayor, Mr. Kim has gone on to do great things in his own quiet way, and brought changes to Hawaii. All Koreans there are proud of him. They, and his fellow Americans, see him as a leader, an effective politician, and a charismatic person who is loved and respected in his state.

PURPOSE

The Council on Korean Studies at Michigan State University was established formally in 1992. The council's main objective is:

- To stimulate interest in Korea among the people of Michigan and the United States,
- To seek and provide information about the Korean cultural activities,
- To exchange programs between Korea and the United States related to art, literature and science,
- To help start and continue Korea-related programs at MSU and other American
- To promote graduate and undergraduate education about Korea and related outreach programs.

MEMBERSHIP

Membership is open to all people interested in Korean affairs. The president, the officers, and the Governing Board are elected by the members as specified by the Council's bylaws. There are five types of memberships: Corporate Member, Individual Life Time Member, Benefactor, Full Member and Associate Member.

ENDOWMENT

The council established an endowment fund in 1992 to provide financial support for its activities. The fund is administrated through the Asian Studies Center in consultation with the Council. A campaign is underway to raise \$2,000,000 in endowment.

ACTIVITIES

The Council has been actively engaged in organizing international conferences, holding a series of workshops and seminars, presenting several cultural events to introduce Korean culture to the large community surrounding MSU, and publishing some publications.
