The Global Korea Award

The Global Korea Award (GKA) was created by the Council on Korean Studies at Michigan State University in 1995 to recognize individuals or groups who have made significant contribution of cross-cultural understanding, global education, and well-being of Korean people around the world. The selection criteria for the award include:

- Demonstrated commitment and unselfish devotion to the well-beings of Korean community and global society,
- Significant contribution to the improvement of understanding between Korean and people around the world,
- Exceptional devotion to quality education for young generation in Korea and the world, and
- Outstanding achievement in scholarly and creative work that advances global understanding of Korea in the global community.

Profiles of the 2010 Award Recipients

Mark A. Peterson, Ph.D.

Mark Peterson began his life-long involvement with Korea in November, 1965, when he was nineteen-years-old. Over the next two decades, he studied in America or Korea and for seven years was the director of the Fulbright scholars program in Korea and finally finished his Ph.D. in Korean Studies at Harvard University. He began teaching at Brigham Young University in 1984, but returned again to Korea between 1987 and 1990, this time supervising 200 younger missionaries as the president of the Korea Pusan Mission. In academics, Professor Peterson has published numerous articles and books on the topics of Korean social history, classic literature, and contemporary Korean events. In service to the field, he has been the chair of the Korean Studies Committee at the Association for Asian Studies and the Korean book review editor at the Journal for Asian Studies. In the latter part of his career he has become a teacher-trainer and an advocate for Korean studies in the secondary school system. He has made over twenty-five presentations for the Korea Society, more than fifteen of which were 12-day seminars in Korea for teachers, school administrators, and textbook publishers. He has led seminars, two or three times a year, for teachers in the Los Angeles area for the last five years, and in the last two years has led teacher-training seminars designed to improve the coverage of Korea in world history and world geography courses in Seattle, Boulder, East Lansing, and Ann Arbor.

Jong S. Kweon

Jong S. Kweon is director and pastor of Cup of Water International. He is a passionate missionary who shows people his gratitude for what Jesus has done for him. He served as a translator of German during the '88 Olympic Games. He finished the M. Div. Program at Anyang University Graduate School of Theology in Korea. Also, he was in the Cross-Cultural Missionary Training Institute (CCMTI) at World Concern Korea. Later, he went to the Russia for the missionary. He came back to Korea and worked at CCTMI as a manager, and assisted many missionaries and supported them. After these achievements, he received Biblical Theological Seminary and finished M.A. in Christian Thought, M.A. in Old Testament and Th. M. in Old Testament at Biblical Theological Seminary. And now he is studying D. Min program at Biblical Theological Seminary. Right now, he and A Cup of Water International are providing wells to undeveloped countries, especially in the muslim communities, with evangelism. Through these wells projects, he wants people to believe Jesus Christ by water.

PURPOSE

The Council on Korean Studies at Michigan State University was established formally in 1992. The council's main objective is:

- To stimulate interest in Korea among the people of Michigan and the United States,
- To seek and provide information about the Korean cultural activities,
- To exchange programs between Korea and the United States related to art, literature and science,
- To help start and continue Korea-related programs at MSU and other American
- To promote graduate and undergraduate education about Korea and related outreach programs.

MEMBERSHIP

Membership is open to all people interested in Korean affairs. The president, the officers, and the Governing Board are elected by the members as specified by the Council's bylaws. There are five types of memberships: Corporate Member, Individual Life Time Member, Benefactor, Full Member and Associate Member.

ENDOWMENT

The council established an endowment fund in 1992 to provide financial support for its activities. The fund is administrated through the Asian Studies Center in consultation with the Council. A campaign is underway to raise \$2,000,000 in endowment.

ACTIVITIES

The Council has been actively engaged in organizing international conferences, holding a series of workshops and seminars, presenting several cultural events to introduce Korean culture to the large community surrounding MSU, and publishing some publications.
